**Subject: Quarterly Disbursement of Measure D Revenues: April – June 2025**

The Alameda County Waste Reduction and Recycling Initiative (Measure D) levies a surcharge on solid waste landfilled in unincorporated Alameda County. Fifty percent of Measure D Recycling Fund revenues are disbursed to cities and sanitary districts that meet criteria contained in the law. Funds disbursed to jurisdictions must be used "...for the continuation and expansion of municipal recycling programs."

The quarterly Measure D disbursement for your jurisdiction, covering the period April through June 2025, has been mailed out. A copy of this letter is also provided to your staff Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) representative or designee.

Population numbers for each jurisdiction were updated in August 2024, according to the Board adopted policy as explained on the second page of this letter.

Annual Measure D reporting forms must be submitted using the StopWaste online web portal by October 23, 2025. Information on how to access the online portal to submit required reporting data will be sent via email to the designee after the TAC meeting on September 4, 2025.

Measure D requires StopWaste to contract with an auditor to determine compliance with Measure D every five years. This audit is separated into two components: one covers the first three years of finance/compliance, and the other covers the final two years of finance/compliance as well as the programmatic analysis for all five years. The initial financial audit component (Phase 1) will be presented to the Recycling Board on December 11, 2025 regarding compliance for Fiscal Years 2022, 2023 and 2024. We appreciate jurisdiction staff support in completing this audit.

Tonnages for April, May and June 2025 (Q4 of fiscal year 2024-2025) were aligned with the forecast amount. An explanation of how funds are allocated is included on the next page.

### **Measure D Fund Allocations to Jurisdictions – Explanation of Calculations and Distributions**

Per [Measure D, subsection 64.060 \(B\)](#), 50% of Measure D tonnage revenue is allocated to qualifying jurisdictions on a per-capita basis. Jurisdictions each receive a per-capita share of the 50% of Measure D fund revenues collected per quarter.

Recycling Board [Resolution 94-27](#) is the policy that identifies the methodologies and procedures that direct the frequency and data sources to be used for calculation of the population-based disbursements from the Measure D Recycling Fund to jurisdictions. Per the Resolution, every two years, in the month of August in the even-numbered year, estimated population is updated using the [State Department of Finance population estimates table E5](#) for cities and unincorporated areas in the County. Accordingly, StopWaste updated Member Agency population estimates and associated allocations in August 2024. Each of the 16 jurisdictions' allocation is calculated by applying the percentage of total Alameda County population that the jurisdiction represents to the total quarterly Measure D revenue collected.

Final Federal Census data are used to update Alameda County jurisdiction population every 10 years. For Oro Loma and Castro Valley Sanitary Districts, the Alameda County Community Development Agency utilizes a combination of Census data for unincorporated Alameda County and Alameda Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCo) jurisdiction boundaries to estimate sanitary district population and provides those estimates to the Waste Management Authority to be applied to sanitary district Measure D disbursements.
