Compost & Recycling Requirements

For Businesses and Multifamily Properties in Alameda County



When recyclable and compostable materials break down in a landfill, they produce methane, a potent greenhouse gas that contributes to climate change. To respond to the climate crisis, **State law SB 1383** requires all businesses, nonprofits, institutions, and multifamily properties (5+ units) to:

1) Sign up for compost (organics) and recycling collection services or have a waiver on file. Contact your service provider to get service.



For waiver eligibility, visit www.StopWaste.org/rules-waivers.

- Set up indoor bins. Color-coded and labeled compost and recycling bins must be placed next to all garbage bins (not required in restrooms). Use green for compost, blue for recycling, black or gray for garbage.
- Sort materials into the proper bins. Owners/managers must ensure materials are sorted correctly into compost, recycling, and garbage.

COMPOST	RECYCLING
Food scraps, compostable paper (paper towels, napkins, etc.), plant waste, and untreated wood	Paper, cardboard, bottles, cans, jars, and rigid plastic containers

Inform staff, contractors, and tenants about proper sorting at least annually.

Check bins regularly, e.g. monthly, and provide feedback if materials are found in the wrong bins.

For property managers: Tenants must be informed about proper sorting no later than 2 weeks after move-in and at least 2 weeks before move-out.

Additional requirement for sites that generate surplus edible food: Sites such as grocery stores, food distributors, health facilities, and large restaurants must recover and donate surplus edible food to feed people. Visit www.StopWaste.org/rules-food-recovery to learn more.

Citations and fines for failure to comply

Fines up to \$500 per violation will continue to be issued every 60 days for non-compliance.

Setting Up Indoor Bins

Free resources for indoor bin stations:

- a. Signmaker tool: create customized signs that show the types of items being thrown away at your business to help with proper sorting.
- b. Information about which bags are allowed in your city to line indoor bins.
- c. Free indoor green bins for compost, up to \$500 worth of bins per approved site.
- d. Free stickers to label bins.



Training and Education

Free virtual or on-site training from our field team. Team members can also help determine compost and recycling service needs and set up indoor compost and recycling stations.

California law SB 1383 went into effect January 2022. In Alameda County, the State law is being implemented and enforced under the Organics Reduction and Recycling Ordinance, which was passed by local government agency StopWaste. StopWaste partners with the cities of Alameda County, their solid waste service providers, and environmental health departments to help sites comply and enforce the law when needed.
